The coronavirus' omicron variant has emerged. It appears that those who are fully vaccinated and boosted enjoy a measure of protection from severe illness.

However, until we get many more people vaccinated, especially in sub-Saharan Africa and other undeveloped parts of the world, it's quite likely that other variants will emerge. Current vaccines may offer much less protection against one of these future variants.

This is a national security issue. We won't be safe until everyone is safe. If a variant as deadly as delta and as transmissible as omicron emerges, it would severely affect not just public health but also the global economy.

Congress needs to provide significantly more funding for global COVID-19 vaccinations, for everyone's sake.

Letters to the editor US must support global vaccine efforts

In 'Moderna morally obligated to do more in COVID fight,' guest columnist Joe Ingle details the COVID vaccine disparity created by vaccine manufacturers' greed. The Biden administration is pressuring Moderna, yet it still focuses sales on wealthier nations.

Meanwhile, less than 10% of people in Africa are fully vaccinated and many low-income countries are imposing new lockdowns due to the delta and omicron variants.

Fortunately, Dr. Peter Hotez, Dr. Maria Elena Bottazzi, Texas Children's Hospital's Center for Vaccine Development and the Baylor College of Medicine are sharing technology for manufacturing their Corbevax vaccine, dubbed 'The World's COVID-19 Vaccine.' They hope the vaccine, proven effective in tests, will achieve low-cost scalability across the world.

Largely due to global vaccine inequity, variants continue to develop. This threatens health and economic stability globally, including in the United States. Whether with the Moderna, Corbevax or other vaccines, we are all morally obligated to do more in the global COVID fight. Congress should support more global efforts. Otherwise, COVID will mutate, infect, spread and kill ... repeatedly.





Regarding "Editorial: Houston-made Corbevax vaccine welcome news in pandemic," (Dec. 31): Kudos for your editorial that says it all about Dr. Maria Elena Bottazzi and Dr. Peter Hotez and their team at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital who have produced a much needed "gift from Texas to the world."

The team has developed an inexpensive yet effective vaccine that can provide the billions of doses that will be needed to vaccinate the 6 billion people in low- and middle-income countries, and finally end the COVID pandemic — truly "a gift from Texas to the world."

Production of the vaccine is underway, and the formula is open for all manufacturers to use.

The two doctors and their team have done their part to end the pandemic without any financial benefit to themselves. It is now time for the rest of us to take action. Our country must do more to expand vaccine manufacturing and access. It is the right thing to do, and also in our own best interest.

If we fail to provide vaccines to people living in low-income countries, we hurt our own prospects of getting rid of COVID-19 in the process. Call or write President Joe Biden and our members of Congress and urge them to follow our Texas example and show strong leadership in vaccine equity to bring an to end this pandemic.

As our hospitals fill again with the unvaccinated and immunocompromised, the Omicron variant has proven once again that the only way out of COVID-19 is to ensure that everyone has access to vaccines and other life-saving tools.

And though anyone in the US who wants to be vaccinated can be, that is not the case for people living in low- and middle-income countries. Five and half million people have died of COVID-19 globally and the pandemic has had severe corollary effects that have dramatically increased global poverty.

With US leadership, the world has set a global goal of vaccinating 70% of the population by September 2022. This would save lives, slow the incubation of variants, and allow economies to recover. This is a great goal, but it also requires funding to get the job done. The estimated cost of reaching the goal is \$63 billion. The US fair share of that would be \$17 billion. The President must request the \$17 billion vaccine supplemental and Congress should include in the final fiscal year 2022 spending bill.

The only way out of COVID is leadership. We're counting on the President and Congress.

Grantee Spotlight



Malaika - Kalebuka, Democratic Republic of the Congo






When COVID-19 forced the DRC into a lockdown, thousands of people in Kalebuka lost their jobs, leaving already poor people in a desperate situation. Simultaneously, the lockdown included the closure of all borders, causing food prices to skyrocket by 500 percent in some cases. Recognizing the dangers, and the immediate needs of the community, Malaika began an emergency food distribution that included basic food items such as maize and beans, as well as hygiene items to help curb the spread of COVID-19. Mama Ya Mapendo members sewed thousands of masks to include in the distribution. Throughout lockdowns, Malaika distributed emergency bags to 7,791 people while also setting up handwashing stations throughout the area and conducting outreach about the virus and prevention.
