


### Malnutrition is the underlying cause of nearly half (45%) of child deaths.

Childhood deaths from the five most lethal infectious diseases worldwide, World










#### **GLOBAL OVERVIEW**

Stunting has declined steadily since 2000 – but faster progress is needed to reach the 2030 target. Wasting persists at alarming rates and overweight will require a reversal in trajectory if the 2030 target is to be achieved.

# By 2022, COVID-19-related disruptions could result in an additional:



- 9.3 million wasted children
- 2.6 million stunted children
- 168,000 additional child deaths
- 2.1 million maternal anemia cases
- \$29.7 billion in future productivity

(In Millions)




#### U.S. Global Health Funding (in millions), By Sector, FY 2021

# Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act of 2021



- Optimize USAID's global nutrition assistance programming by increasing the four most effective interventions (known as the Power 4)
- Establish clear implementation and congressional reporting requirements to better track progress
- Elevate and increase coordination of nutrition programming within USAID and other agencies
