
The Child Tax Credit works.


Notes: Assumes all income comes from earnings, and child meets all tests to be a CTC-qualifying dependent. \$3,000 and \$3,600 credits are fully refundable; prior law limited refunds to \$1,400 out of the maximum \$2,000 godic Credit for maximum payers first of assess out at \$150,000 of income until credit reaches pre-2021 level;

Percent of households with incomes below \$35,000 who spent their credit payments on:






Vast majority of low-income families spent some or all of their new monthly payments on basic necessities — housing, food, clothing, and utilities — and education.


Short-Term Goals:



- Extend the CTC expansion
- Ensure the lowest-income families get the full amount
- A large-scale reconciliation package is still our biggest opportunity to secure lasting structural changes to the tax code – especially a fully refundable CTC that reaches families with no- or low-incomes
- Policymakers looking for ways to help families with higher costs CTC is a great tool for this!
- Goal: secure a deal on an economic package this month, then pass legislation this summer

Impact of Making the CTC Fully Refundable





Full permanent refundability ensures families with no- or low-incomes get the full CTC and helps close racial poverty gaps

Long-Term Goal:



- Build Broad Bipartisan Support for a Robust Monthly CTC that Reduces Poverty
- Make it clear to Congressional offices that we are focused on this important policy and the impact on child poverty – not the legislative vehicle
 - Ask them how they can move it forward with colleagues
- As needed: 2015 redux?





Global Poverty Campaign Updates



Where We Are: Appropriations

House deadline – closed April 27th. **Senate is still ongoing!**

- 120 signers on House TB letter (Highest ever!)
- 149 signers on House Global Fund/PEPFAR letter
- 178 signers on House Maternal and Child Health/Nutrition letter



Current Global Asks

FY23 Funding requests/letters still ongoing in Senate – *committee deadline May 19!*

- \$2 billion for Global Fund in FY23
- \$1 billion for Tuberculosis in FY23
- \$300 million for Nutrition in FY23

Emergency Supplemental funding – *Timing TBD*

- \$5 billion for global COVID vaccine delivery
- \$5 billion for global Food Aid/Nutrition





\$18 billion to fight AIDS, TB, malaria, and build equitable health systems

- Save 20 million lives from HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria
- Stop more than 450 million infections or cases
- Shrink inequities in access to health
- Reinforce health systems, supporting health workers, labs, and supply chains


