


FY23 Federal Revenue

Discretionary spending

- *Optional* spending
- Typically done for one year at a time
- Two main categories
 - Defense (DOD): funding for military operations
 - Non-Defense Discretionary (NDD): funding for everything else, such as education, scientific research, infrastructure, national parks, environmental protection, etc, **including foreign assistance, housing programs, and WIC.**


Where RESULTS advocacy fits into the budget

Mandatory spending

- Spending that does not have to be approved every year and is required by law.
- Includes **Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security, SNAP** and a few other programs.
- Accounts for the biggest chunk of the budget.



Congress decides how to spend money during the **appropriations** process. This funding can support health, education, and economic opportunity for families around the world.




President's Budget Request (PBR)

results

- The Office of Management and Budget and White House officials begin shaping up to 18 months prior to the start of the Fiscal Year.
- A policy document, part of the administration's vision.
- Only a proposal. Congress does not have to follow it. Can often be seen as "dead on arrival", even by many in their own party.
- New policies are often previewed in the State of the Union address

OMB begins working on future budgets early



After the State of the Union, the President sends their budget request to Congress



What is supposed to happen...

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Twelve appropriations subcommittees in the **House** and **Senate** hold public hearings and prepare appropriations bills. Discretionary spending limits are set by the budget resolution (if Congress does one), which can also include changes to taxes and mandatory programs.




The full **Appropriations Committees** in the **House** and **Senate** vote on the 12 bills approved in subcommittee.



The full **House** and full **Senate** vote on each appropriations bill.



The 12 bills go to the **White House** and are signed into law.

But in reality...

results

- The PBR is often delayed due to urgent political realities and delays from previous years' spending bills
- The House and Senate are supposed to pass a final budget resolution that sets the funding allocations for all 12 sub-committees by mid-April, however...
- Unless one party controls both the House and Senate, we rarely see budget resolutions anymore.
- The bills **MUST** pass by the end of the fiscal year – September 30th – or the government goes unfunded (a “shutdown”).

“Laws are like sausages, it is better not to see them being made.”



All aboard the omnibus

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The current budget process has been in effect almost 50 years, but **Congress has only managed to pass all its required measures four times** (fiscal years 1977, 1989, 1995, 1997)

So where are we now?

- The U.S. fiscal year is the accounting period that runs Oct. 1 – Sept. 30 of the following year. **We are currently in Fiscal Year 2026, which started on October 1, 2025.**
- Congress finally passed its FY26 appropriations bills this week – four months after the start of the fiscal year!
- Now, preparations for FY27 appropriations are beginning.


Dear Chairman Leahy, Vice Chairman Shelby, Chairman Grass, and Ranking Member Graham:

As you determine priorities for the Fiscal Year 2023 State, Foreign Operations and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, we respectfully request that you provide **global funding for the Maternal and Child Health (MCH) and Nutrition Accounts within the Global Health Programs account at USAID**. Adequate funding for the MCH and Nutrition accounts is critical to providing effective, evidence-based, poverty-focused assistance that saves lives and helps strengthen economies in developing countries.

This Committee has a long-standing record of supporting critical, life-saving investments in global child and maternal health and nutrition. In 2020 alone, USAID helped more than 82 million women and children access essential—and often life-saving—health services, reaching 27 million children under five years old and 6 million pregnant women with high impact, life-saving nutrition interventions.

While reductions in global mortality rates for women and children are two of the biggest success stories in international development, there remains significant gaps that additional investments can help close. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, 5.2 million children under age five died from mainly preventable and treatable diseases each year, with malnutrition as the underlying cause of roughly half of those deaths. Additionally, 300,000 women die annually of preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth. COVID-19 continues to interrupt routine and necessary health and nutrition services.

The MCH account supports delivery of cost-effective, proven, life-saving services in countries where the burden of preventable deaths is the highest. USAID's investments provide access to skilled birth attendants and emergency obstetric care, training for frontline health workers, life-saving health commodities, and nutrition services like breastfeeding support. A critical portion of the MCH account supports Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, a public-private partnership that has helped to immunize a whole generation – more than 600 million children – and prevented more than 11 million deaths, helping to reduce child mortality by 73 fewer women countries. At Gavi's leaders offers to continue vaccine manufacturing and deliver COVID-19

Dear Chairman Coons and Ranking Member Graham:

We are writing to request that you continue critical investments in global health programs, in particular the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (Global Fund) in advance of its Seventh Replenishment in the Fall of 2022. We are grateful for your leadership in ensuring these programs continue to be adequately funded, and look to you again as PEPFAR and the Global Fund work towards the rapid eradication of HIV prevention and treatment programs with the goal of ending the AIDS epidemic while protecting progress from the impact of COVID-19.

U.S. leadership through PEPFAR and other bilateral investments, along with multilateral investments in the Global Fund over time, have been transformative in fighting the deadly HIV/AIDS epidemic, and the results are astounding. In 2021, PEPFAR supported 500-saving antiretroviral treatment for 15.99 million people. Through PEPFAR support, over 7.1 million orphans, vulnerable children and their caregivers received critical care and support services and since its inception, more than 2.8 million new infections were averted in children.

At the same time, the Global Fund's efforts have saved over 64 million lives since its inception in 2002. In 2020, the Global Fund supported 21.4 million people on antiretroviral treatment for HIV, treated 4.7 million people for TB, and distributed 180 million insecticide-treated bed nets for malaria prevention.

Similar to HIV, progress on the TB epidemic hinges on finding the over three million people “missed” by health systems each year. By focusing on TB countries that account for a majority of missed people with TB globally, Global Fund investments contributed to over one million additional TB case notifications by the end of 2019. At the heart of the Global Fund's Seventh Replenishment this fall, we reiterate a critical theme for the U.S. to display strong international leadership in the fight against these diseases.

Despite the tremendous progress made on HIV globally, every week, almost 6,000 young women aged 15-24 are infected with HIV worldwide. PEPFAR and the Global Fund are

Housing**

Homelessness is a Policy Choice

- Evidence shows that we can solve homelessness if we address its primary driver: the gap between incomes and rent.
- Rental assistance is effective but **federal funding annually leaves behind a majority of the families** that need it.
- About 8.5 million households with very low incomes who received no housing assistance **pay more than half their income on rent.**
- Insufficient annual funding for rental assistance means too often **low-income families are forced to choose between paying rent or meeting other basic needs.**

Housing Choice Vouchers

- Annually funded by Congress through the T-HUD Bill.
- Serves 2.3 million low-income families that earn less than the federal poverty line, which includes over 2 million children.
- Vouchers sharply reduce homelessness and lift more than a million people above the poverty line.
- Only 1 in 4 families who qualify for rental assistance are able to get it.

Housing EPIC Laser Talk: Problem

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Problem:

Nearly half of all renters are rent-burdened, spending over 30 percent of their income on housing. Rising costs for food, health care, and other essentials are pushing too many families toward housing instability and homelessness.

This crisis is solvable. Housing Choice Vouchers (HCVs) and other special purpose vouchers currently help 2.4 million households stay stably housed and move toward economic security.

The program provides flexible supports like rental assistance, landlord incentives, and help with move-in costs. However, chronic underfunding means only one in four eligible households receives assistance.

How do I create the EPIC Laser Talk?

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- **E = Engage:** Get the listener's attention with a dramatic fact or short value statement.
- **P = State the Problem:** Share the problem you want to listener to solve.
- **I = Inform about Solutions:** Inform the listener about a solution to the problem.
- **C = Call to action:** Tell the listener as specific as possible what you want them to do.
 - Ideally, phrase your Call to Action in the form of a yes or no question.

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Engage:

While tuberculosis (TB) is often thought of as a disease of the past, it is the world's leading infectious killer. Many cases are curable, but access to treatment often comes too late.

2026 EPIC Laser Talk: Tuberculosis

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- Personalize your **Engage** statement:
 - How do you relate to this issue?
 - What resonates with you?
 - Do you have a personal story about TB you want to share?

2026 EPIC Laser Talk: Tuberculosis

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Problem:

We've known how to prevent, treat, and cure TB for decades yet an estimated 10.7 million people fell ill and 1.23 million died in 2024. Every year, 2.7 million go undiagnosed. Treatment and diagnosis disruptions last year may lead to more drug resistance and millions of additional cases and deaths.

- Personalize your **Problem** statement:
 - Although TB has not gone to pandemic levels in the U.S., it is a global disease and does exist in our country.
 - Do you know the stats in your state/district?
 - Diseases know no borders, TB is airborne, so it can impact anyone, anywhere.

2026 EPIC Laser Talk: Tuberculosis

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Inform:

Congress can play a key role by continuing U.S. support for bilateral global TB programs. In 2023 alone, the U.S. supported the treatment of 113,000 cases of drug-resistant TB, diagnosis of 6.4 million patients, and prevention for 2.4 million people at the highest risk. Crucial research and new innovations have dramatically shortened TB treatment, reduced side effects, and saved more lives.

Call to Action:

Congress can support countries to prevent, find, and treat all forms of TB. Will you urge appropriators to include \$1 billion for bilateral global Tuberculosis in Fiscal Year 2027 (FY27)?


