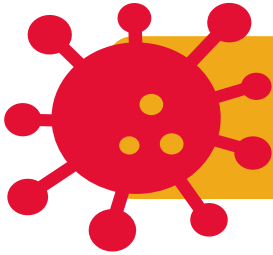

## Re-evaluating the potential impact and cost-effectiveness of rotavirus vaccination in 73 Gavi countries: a modelling study

### Abstract

**Background:** Previous studies have found rotavirus vaccination to be highly cost-effective in low-income countries. However, updated evidence is now available for several inputs (ie, rotavirus disease mortality rates, rotavirus age distributions, vaccine timeliness, and vaccine efficacy by duration of follow-up), new rotavirus vaccines have entered the market, vaccine prices have decreased, and cost-effectiveness thresholds have been re-examined. We aimed to provide updated cost-effectiveness estimates to inform national decisions about the new introduction and current use of rotavirus vaccines in Gavi countries.

**Methods:** We calculated the potential costs and effects of rotavirus vaccination for ten successive birth cohorts in 73 countries previously and currently eligible for Gavi support, compared with no vaccination. We used a deterministic cohort model to calculate numbers of rotavirus gastroenteritis cases, outpatient visits, hospitalisations, and deaths between birth and 5 years, with and without rotavirus vaccination. We calculated treatment costs from the government and societal perspectives.

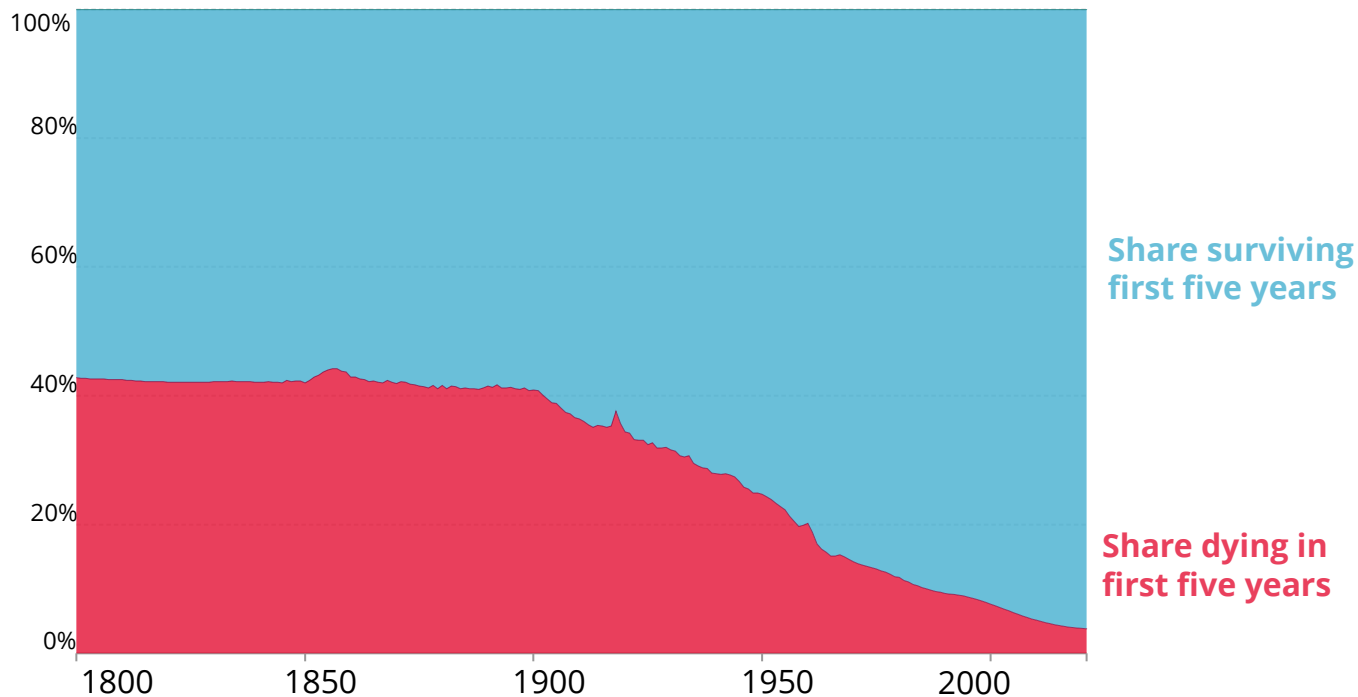

The estimated share of newborns who die or survive the first five years of life.

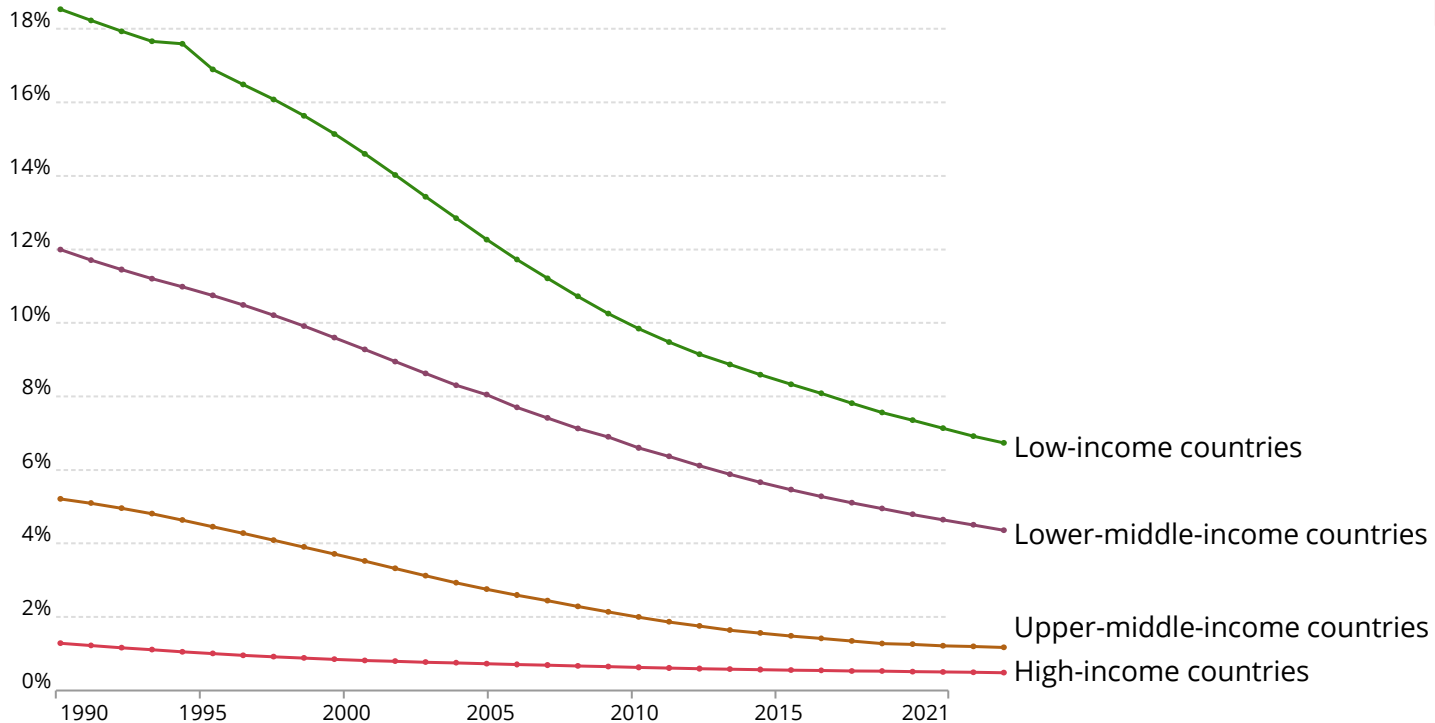

The estimated share of newborns who die before reaching the age of five.



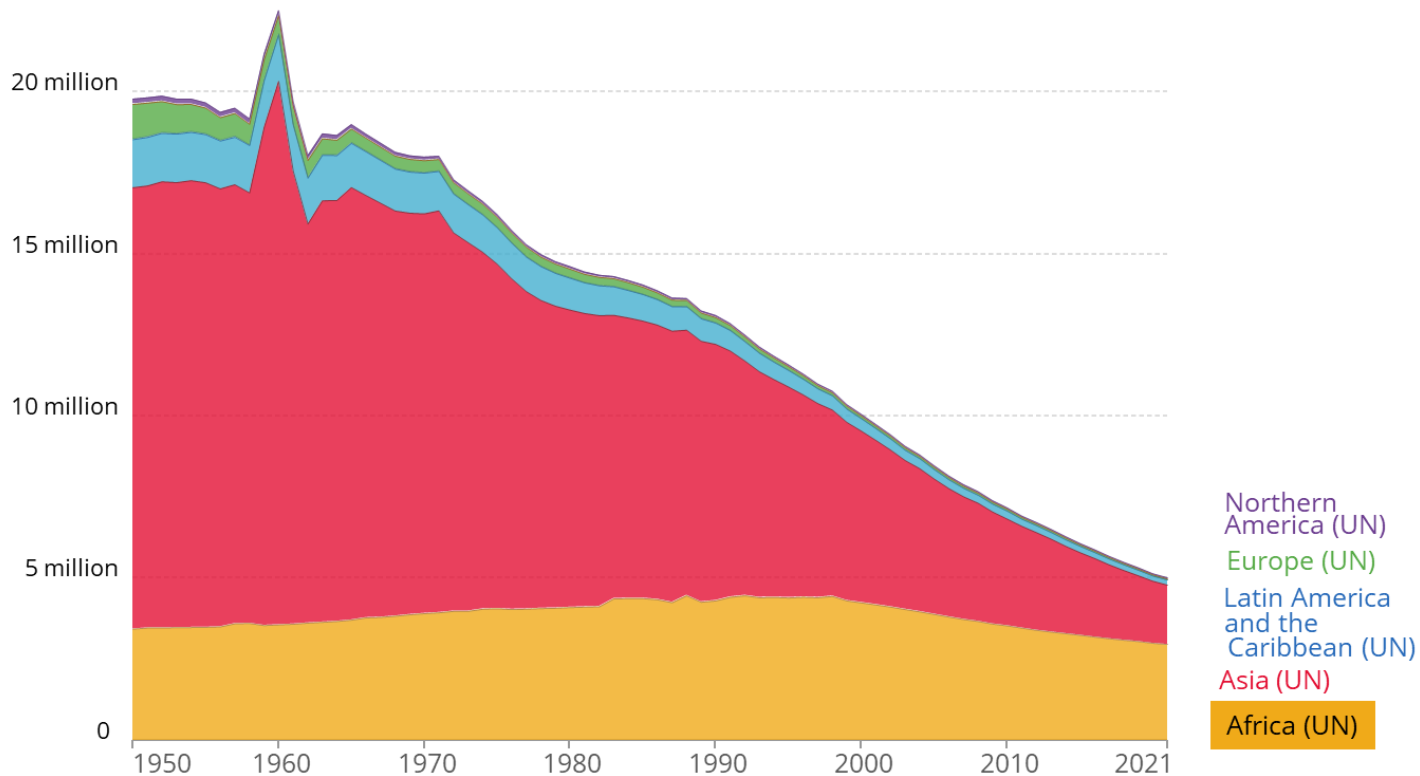

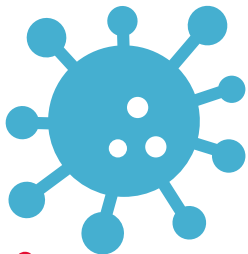

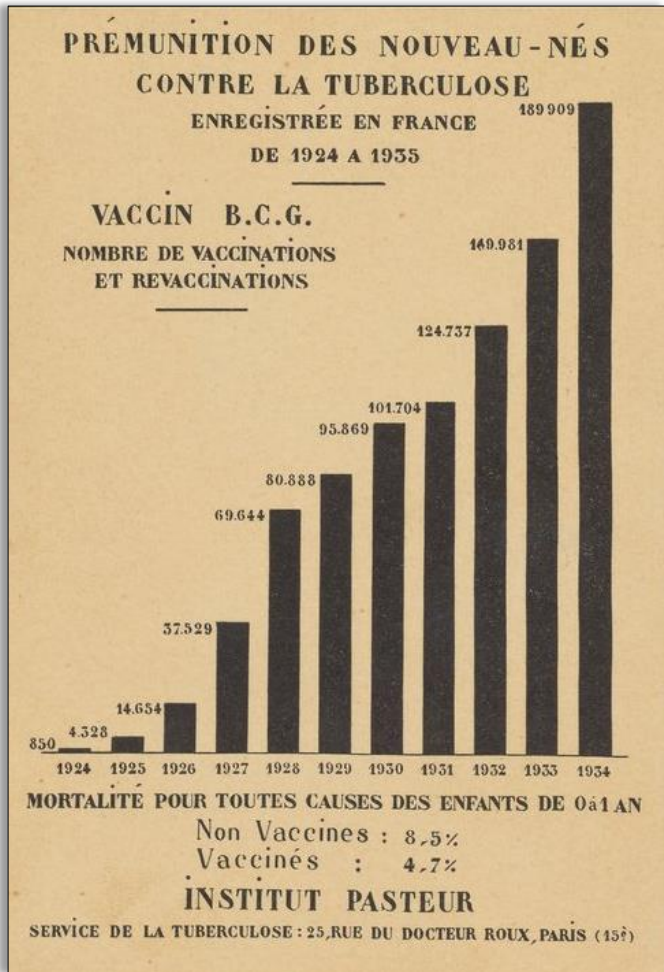

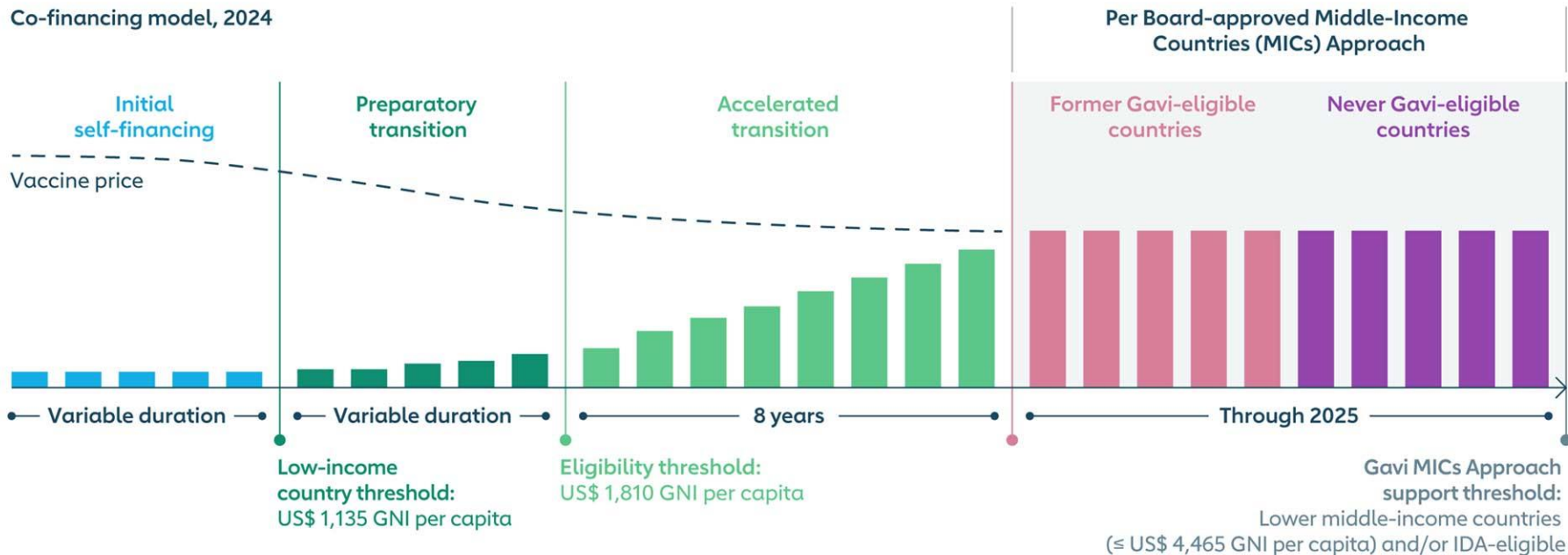

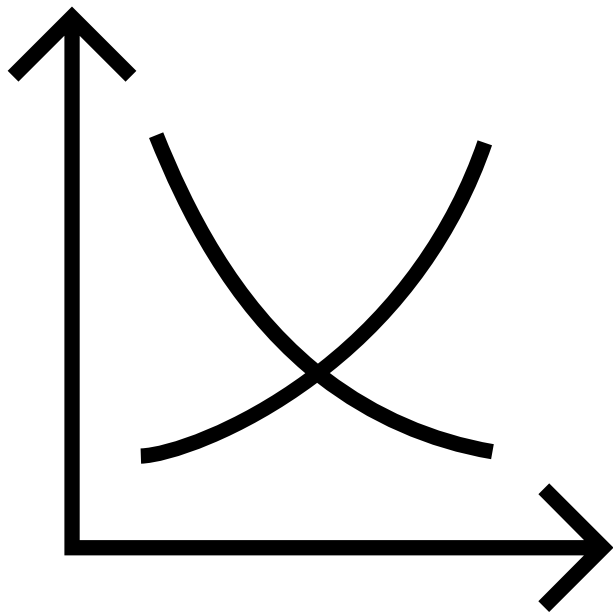

# gavi by the numbers

results

- **1 billion** children immunized
- **17 million** future deaths prevented
- **50%** of the world's children vaccinated by Gavi
- **\$54** returned for every \$1 invested
- **19** countries transitioned out of support



Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance is a public-private partnership that helps vaccinate more than half the world's children against some of the world's deadliest diseases.

**The vaccine goal.**  
**56%**  
Breath of protection with vaccines in the Gavi portfolio is now higher in Gavi-supported countries (56%) than in the rest of the world (53%).

- 80 Gavi-supported vaccine introductions and preventive campaigns took place in 2022 – in addition to 40 outbreak response vaccination campaigns supported by Gavi.
- 4 key SDG vaccines saw an increase in coverage among the 37 Gavi-supported countries since 2021.
- 20 countries assessed cholera, Ebola, meningococcal and yellow fever vaccines through Gavi-supported emergency readiness a total of 39 times in 2022.

future deaths averted, 2000-2022. In addition, >2.7m deaths were averted by COVAX across participating low- and middle-income countries.

**The equity goal**  
**81%**  
In 2022, DTP3 coverage in Gavi-supported countries rebounded to 81% after two years of decline (compared to the 84% global average).

- 2.6 million more children received basic routine immunizations through Gavi-supported health systems in 2022 than in 2021.
- 47 countries have installed more than 45,000 GCE units procured by UNICEF Supply Division through Gavi's CS3SP – nearly 14,000 in 2022 alone.
- 25 Gavi-supported countries increased MCV3 coverage from 2021 to 2022, but smaller investments remain a significant concern.

**The sustainability goal**  
**\$1.5bn by and 2022**  
In the face of fiscal challenges, climate change, conflict and instability, most Gavi-supported countries maintained or increased domestic resources for co-financing of Gavi-supported vaccines in 2022, bringing to US\$ 1.5 billion their total contribution since the introduction of the co-financing policy in 2007.

- US\$ 616 million was contributed by countries towards the co-financing of Gavi-supported vaccines in 2022 – the highest amount yet and a testament to country ownership and the long-term financial sustainability of Gavi-supported vaccines.
- 39 vaccine programmes originally financed with Gavi funding are now self-financed by countries as of 2022, up from 28 in 2021.
- 100% of countries fully met their 2022 co-financing obligations – except those values for humanitarian crises.

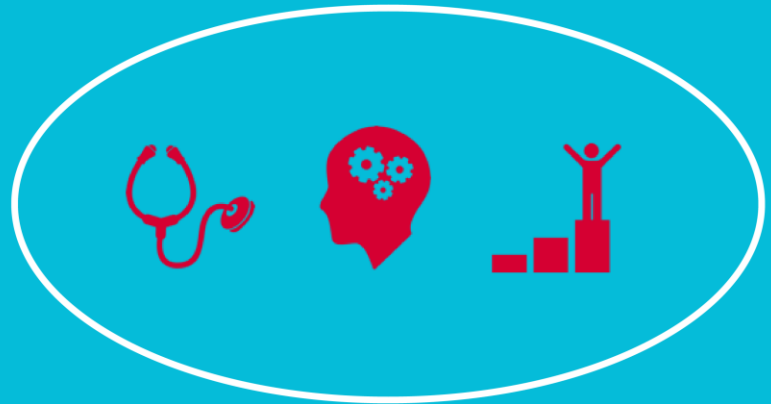

Dear Chairwoman Murray, Vice Chairwoman Collins, Chairman Coons, and Ranking Member Graham,

As you determine priorities for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 State, Foreign Operations and Related Agency Appropriations Act, we respectfully request that you provide robust funding for the Maternal and Child Health (MCH) account, including Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, and the Nutrition account, both within Global Health Programs (GHP) at USAID. Adequate funding for the MCH and Nutrition accounts is necessary to preserve effective, evidence-based, poverty-focused assistance that saves lives and helps strengthen economies in low-income countries. We appreciate this Committee's long-standing record supporting life-saving investments in global child and maternal health and nutrition.

Since 2000, through USAID investment, under-five child mortality has dropped by 58 percent and maternal mortality by 42 percent across USAID's priority countries. While reductions in mortality rates for women and children are two of the biggest success stories in international development, progress has slowed for more than a decade. Every year, around 5 million children under age five die from malnutrition and treatable diseases, with malnutrition as the underlying cause of roughly half of these deaths. Moreover, nearly 300,000 women die annually of preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth. Additional investments will spur progress against these preventable deaths and continue to build America's legacy and leadership in maternal and child health and nutrition.

The MCH account supports the delivery of cost-effective, proven services in countries with the highest burden of preventable maternal and child deaths. Over the past decade, USAID programs have helped save more than six million lives; since 2012, USAID's life-saving investments have enabled 57 million
