Reconciliation vs. Appropriations vs. Rescissions... Eeek!





But before we get to that... two more (needlessly long and slightly-inaccurate) terms:

Government spending "Mandatory" vs. "Discretionary"



Government spending

Mandatory: Automatic, based on the law.

Discretionary: Set every year.

The processes we're talking about tonight affect both (in different ways).



Reconciliation

changes tax & spending rules (long-term)

Appropriations sets spending for next year



Rescissions reverses these decisions, one-by-one

An example.

If the U.S. government was a household...



Household "reconciliation"

- Get a new job
- Take out a 5-year car loan
- Sign a new lease

Long-term choices about money (and life!)

I can change them eventually – but it's not easy.



Reconciliation:

- Change how Medicaid works
- Limit who can get SNAP
- Cut certain taxes

Long-term choices about money (and government!)
We can change them eventually – but it's not easy.



Household "appropriations"

- Clothes
- Groceries
- Lunch money for my kid

My spending plan for the year.



Appropriations:

- TB programs
- Contribution to the Global Fund
- Housing choice vouchers

Government spending plan for the year.



Household "rescissions"

My kid's school decides not to feed him one day, and sends him home with his lunch money – but hungry.



Rescissions:

Line-by-line cut to education, global health, or any other funding line the White House targets.

Random take-backs, with or without a plan.

for reference: the

Reconciliation (rules & policies)

- WHEN: Max 1 per fiscal year
- WHO: Simple majority vote
- WHAT: "Mandatory spending", Esoteric rules

Appropriations (spending)

- WHEN: Annual process
- WHO: 60 votes (ie bipartisan)
- WHAT: "Discretionary" annual spending

Rescissions (cuts)

- WHEN: Rare (from the White House)
- WHO: Simple majority vote
- WHAT: One-by-one reversing appropriations

for reference:

Reconciliation (rules & policies)

- For this fiscal year, done.
- For next fiscal year, as soon as the fall, or as late as never!

Appropriations (spending)

- House committee passed their bill, now onto the Senate
- Likely a short-term funding patch by 9/30 ("continuing resolution").
- House and Senate will need to keep negotiating.

Rescissions (cuts)

- Recent package is done.
- A different package could be sent by White House any time, or never!
