

# Support FY27 Funding to Eliminate Tuberculosis

Dear Colleague:

Please join us in supporting the fight against tuberculosis by supporting \$225 million to eliminate tuberculosis (TB) in the U.S., and \$1 billion for the global fight against TB, as part of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 Appropriations process.

While often thought of as a disease of the past, TB remains a serious threat in the United States and worldwide. The Global TB Report found that TB sickened 10.8 million people and killed 1.23 million in 2024. **In the U.S., this airborne disease remains a significant public health issue as every single state continues to report cases of TB each year.** While on the decline for well over a decade, since COVID-19-era disruptions in health services, the U.S. has seen an increase in TB cases every year. **According to the CDC, there are up to 13 million individuals in the U.S. with latent TB infections, a reservoir of future active TB cases. TB has resurged worldwide as the foremost lethal infectious disease** in most low- and middle-income countries and disproportionately affects people in poorest and vulnerable communities both in the U.S. and around the world. This resurgence of TB must be met with the resources needed to strengthen our domestic and global efforts to identify, treat, and prevent tuberculosis, including drug resistant TB and TB infection. Strong funding is critical for research, including efforts to develop new diagnostics, treatments, and prevention tools.

TB deaths are entirely preventable. If found and treated, drug-sensitive TB is a curable disease with a round of antibiotics. To sustain this lifesaving work, regain progress in ending TB, and safeguard our communities, the CDC's domestic TB program should be funded at \$225 million and global TB programs should be funded at \$1 billion in FY 2027.

Dear Chairman Aderholt, Ranking Member DeLauro, Chairman Diaz-Balart, and Ranking Member Frankel,

As you craft legislation making appropriations for fiscal year (FY) 2027, we respectfully ask that you prioritize increasing investments in the fight to eliminate tuberculosis (TB) which is again the leading infectious disease killer in the world.

Over the past decade, Congress has almost annually increased resources for the fight against TB, a clear demonstration of the strong bipartisan support for these programs across multiple administrations. The State Department clearly concurs with these significant bipartisan majorities, identifying elimination of TB as a key priority in the America First Global Strategy. We applaud the bold targets the Administration set forth in the strategy, which include reducing TB cases by 80% by 2030 and TB deaths by 90% by 2030 (both compared to 2015 levels). Yet with TB resurging as the foremost infectious disease in most low- and middle-income countries – and, as a result, harming U.S. communities – fulfilling the Administration’s goals requires bold investments in TB programming.

TB is not a disease of the past. On the contrary, it is on the rise worldwide and a threat in every U.S. state. The Global TB Report found that TB sickened almost 11 million people and killed 1.23 million in 2024. In the United States, every single state continues to report cases of TB each year and most states saw an increase in TB in 2024. According to the CDC, there are up to 13 million individuals in the U.S. with latent TB infections, a reservoir of future active TB cases. This resurgence of TB must be met with increased investments to strengthen our domestic and global efforts to identify, treat, and prevent tuberculosis, including drug resistant TB and TB infection.

Achieving the goals the U.S. set for ending TB will require \$1 billion for bilateral TB programming and \$225 million for TB programs at the CDC in the upcoming fiscal year. We are grateful for the \$1.765 billion the Committee provided in FY26 for CDC TB programs, State Department bilateral programming, and the U.S. leadership in the Global Fund to End AIDS, TB, and Malaria. These investments are highly effective in preventing TB deaths. For example, Global Fund-supported programs have reduced the combined death rate of AIDS, TB, and malaria by 63% since 2002. **With the historic strain on TB programs as rates and deaths continue to rise, we respectfully request that you continue to prioritize and increase funding for these programs in the FY27 funding bill.**

Disruptions to these lifesaving programs accelerate TB’s spread and we cannot afford that risk. We again urge you to increase TB funding to fight this preventable and curable disease globally and in the U.S., in addition to maintaining past and current U.S. commitments to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. **TB anywhere is TB everywhere, including here at home in American neighborhoods.** Thank you for your consideration of this request.
