Background: 2024 Campaigns



- Because of advocacy, we've made a lot of progress on poverty globally, 38% to 12%
- But at the current rate we won't reach 2030 Sustainable Development Goal of ending extreme poverty.
- There are still have 700 million people living on less than \$2.15/day. More than half are children.
- We need to double-down on our advocacy.

2024: Malnutrition



- Malnutrition is an underlying cause of poverty, affecting physical and mental health, and the ability to work.
- Malnutrition is the underlying cause of nearly 50% of preventable child deaths, causes stunting (short for age) and is a leading cause of disabilities
- 1 in 5 children are affected by stunting—it robs children of their future potential.
- Good nutrition starts with the mother.

2024: Malnutrition



We will:

- Hold USAID accountable on the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act.
- Advocate for increased funding for global maternal and child health and nutrition.
- Lay the groundwork for a US leadership around a Nutrition for Growth (N4G) pledging moment, likely in 2025.

2024: Vaccines



We will:

- Advocate for increased funding for Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.
- Lay the groundwork for a bold, 4-year, US pledge for the Gavi replenishment moment.
- Gavi has vaccinated over 1 billion children and prevented 17 million deaths.

2024: Education



We will:

- Advocate for the passage of the READ Act
- Advocate for increased funding for global education, particularly the Global Partnership for Education (GPE)
- Lay the groundwork for a bold US pledge the Global Partnership for Education during an upcoming pledging moment

2024: Our Boldness



- We need to feature our boldness and fearlessness in 2024, taking action, reaching out to others, showing that they too can be powerful.
- This is an election year and a lot of people will be searching for ways to make a difference. Voting is only the first step.


FY25 Appropriations

Dear Chairman Leahy, Vice Chairman Shelby, Chairman Coons, and Ranking Member Graham:

As you determine priorities for the Fiscal Year 2023 State, Foreign Operations and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, we respectfully respect that you provide pubmst funding, for the Maternal and Child Health (MCII) and Sutrition Accounts within the Global Health Agenta Amazonat at USAI). Adequate funding for the MCII and Nutrition accounts is stated to preserving effective, evidence-based, poverty-focused assistance that saves lives and holms strendthen concomings in devolutions countries.

This Committee has a long-standing record of supporting critical, life-saving investments in global child and maternal health and nutrition. In 2020 alone, USAID helped more than 92 million women and childran excess essential—and often lifesaving—health services, reaching 27 million children under five years old and 8 million pregnant women with high impact, life-saving nutrition intercontract.

While reductions in global mortality rates for women and children are two of the biggast secess stories in international development, ther remain significant gaps that additional investments can help close. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, 52 million children under age fived dief from mainly preventable and treathed diseases each year, with malantiration as underlying cause of roughly half of these deaths. Additionally 30,000 women die annually of preventables caused and children covered to the contract of the preventable causes.

The MCH account supports delivery of conte-ffective, proven, life-awing services in counties where the bunder of preventible deaths is the highest USAID's inverements provide access to skilled birth attendants and emergency obstetric care, training for frontline health workers, life-awing health commodities, and natirities services like beautefeeding support. A critical portion of the MCH account supports Govi, the Vaccine Alliance, a public-private partnership that has helped to immunize a whole generation—more than SSR million children and prevented more than 15 million deaths, helping to halve child mortality in 73 lower-incommon countries. Requesting a Meetings with Congress



- Request to meet with your member of Congress:
 a) Use <u>Legislator Look Up</u>, find **the scheduler** b) Use <u>sample meeting request letter</u>, copy staff
- Request times that work with the people you want to join you if possible
- Follow up on the request!

Requesting a Meeting



- Once you have a time, invite people to join you:
 RPCVs, friends, family, RESULTS, faith community
- Contact Karyne or Ken to set up a meeting planning time.
- Review materials, leave behinds, laser talks

Preparing to Meet



- Create an agenda and assign roles using the RESULTS Lobby Planning Form
- Practice speaking points (EPIC)
- Reconfirm your meeting the day before

After Your Meeting



- Send a thank you note and summary of asks
- Report your meeting
- Continue to follow up on requests
