End TB Now Act (S. 228 / H.R. 1776)



End TB Now Act (S.288, H.R. 1776)



- 1. Requires the U.S. to establish bold goals for reaching the most vulnerable populations
- Strengthens U.S. bilateral coordination to develop comprehensive global TB response
- 3. Catalyzes support for TB research and development (R&D)
- 4. Improves TB capacity of high-burden countries & affected communities
- 5. Requires annual report to Congress on U.S. TB activities and impact
- 6. Evaluates the performance of TB programs that are supported by U.S.



The READ Act Reauthorization (S.41, H.R. 681)



The READ Act (S.41, H.R. 681)



- 1. Developing a comprehensive integrated U.S. strategy that improves educational opportunities and addresses key barriers to children's school attendance, retention and completion, **especially for girls**;
- 2. Ensuring education services for children affected by conflict and other emergencies;
- 3. Coordinating U.S. government efforts to efficiently and effectively manage resources;
- 4. Working with countries to strengthen systems in order to build longterm sustainability;



The READ Act (S.41, H.R. 681)



- 5. Engaging with key partners including other donors, civil society and multilateral initiatives, including the Global Partnership for Education, to leverage U.S. contributions to achieve a greater overall impact;
- 6. Requiring specific indicators and objectives with which to measure progress; and
- 7. Improving the transparency and accountability of our basic education programs, ensuring taxpayer dollars have the most impact for children worldwide.

TOGETHER WOMEN RISE Gavi by the numbers



- 1 billion children immunized
- 17 million future deaths prevented
- 50% of the world's children vaccinated by Gavi
- \$54 returned for every \$1 invested
- 19 countries transitioned out of support



Gavi's 6th Replenishment Strategy



- At June 20 conference, Gavi officially introduced a new 5-year strategy and aims to protect 500 million children save more than 8 million lives between 2026-2030
- 60 % by 2040 Launch of the African Vaccine Manufacturing Accelerator (AVMA), African Union has a goal to produce 60% of the continents' vaccines by 2040
- The Biden Administration's figure of \$1.58 billion over 5 years sets us up for historic success.
- Now we'll need Congress to deliver that funding and push the amount even higher.



Gavi Resolutions – H.Res. 1286/ S. Res. 684



- Senate Lead Sponsors: Sens. Wicker (R-MI) and Cardin (D-MD)
 House Lead Sponsors: Representatives Kean (R-NJ), Amo (D-RI), Salazar (R-FL), and Jacobs (D-CA).
- Calls for United States to have supporting role in saving children's lives of children and protecting people's health through Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.
- Gavi has been a major contributor in reducing the number of childhood deaths in lower-income countries due to vaccine-preventable disease by 70 percent since 2000.

Tasers are dangerous

Regarding "S.F. cops need Tasers" (Letters, Jan. 25): Tasers are not the non-lethal means as letter suggests.

Reuters news service in 2019 tallied 1,081 Taser-related deaths, and the Department of Justice estimates the chance of dying from Taser is 1 in 400.

Sometimes Tasers fail to immobilize an enraged person. Also, the device makes it too easy for police to misuse in benign and already controlled situations. There have been instances of officers killing a person with a pistol when thinking it was a Taser.

As many communities around the nation have stopped the use of Tasers by police, the San Francisco policy is not due to politics but to safety.

Tips on writing LTEs



- Remember your C's
 - Be current respond to recent article or current event
 - Construct your LTE in EPIC format
 - Keep it concise: Rule of thumb is 150 200 words or less (follow the paper's guidelines on word count)
 - Connect the dots: How is this relevant to your community/district/state?



Tips on writing LTEs



- Remember your C's
 - Be challenging ask a question (but don't make a personal attack), name your member of Congress
 - Have a call to action whether for Congress or from the reader
 - Be creative!
 - Be **contagious:** Submit to as many newspapers as possible



Media: The US must make a strong, early pledge to Nutrition for Growth

Tragically, we keep seeing headlines about kids and families grappling for survival around the world. Violent conflict in places like Gaza and the Ukraine spur alarming downward trends in child survival.

Now, almost 5 million children will die before their fifth birthday. Malnutrition is the underlying cause of almost half of those deaths.

Proper nutrition can make or break a child's chance at surviving illness and the other harms of dire poverty. World leaders are gearing up to make pledges to a key global partnership, Nutrition for Growth, to help open up access to nutritious food for children. The U.S. must lead this charge, so other countries will follow suit by the March 2025 Nutrition for Growth pledging summit.

Submit a letter to the editor today urging U.S. leaders to make a bold, early pledge to Nutrition for Growth and help end malnutrition around the world.




Book: Radical Inclusion: Seven Steps to Help You Create a More Just Workplace, Home, and World by David Moinina Sengeh

Speaker: Jean Paul Murunga – Program Officer, End Sexual Violence with Equality Now

Summary: As the newly appointed minister of education in Sierra Leone, David Moinina Sengeh assumed that the administration he served —not to mention his family and friends—shared his conviction that all girls belong in the classroom. He was shocked to learn that many of those closest to him, including a member of his own household, were against lifting a long-standing policy banning pregnant girls from school.

Radical Inclusion is the dramatic narrative of Sengeh's drive to guarantee pregnant girls' right to an education. His story functions as a parable that can help us all advocate for change by reimagining the systems that perpetuate exclusion.
